


Another map dated in 1928. See "Lo Wu Brick Works".

• The next page of the conversation goes on to describe the difficulty of acquiring the land. The underlined paragraph seems to imply that Mr. Tse, son of the company's manager, had already started the business and so that he may carry on the work even without acquiring the land.

4. Mr. Tse informs me that the brickworks could carry on for about 4 or 5 years without the privately owned land. They have machinery for getting clay from a depth of 30 ft. so that if the clay is there, they should get plenty to go on with. . . He further tells me that the private owners say it is not a question of money," but that they want the land to grow food food: the Coy. is willing to pay more than their offer quoted by Mr. Tratman in his minute of 10. 4. 23 above, but the owners will not even name a figure. 


